MINUTES

I. Welcome

Chairman Wesley Davidson welcomed everyone, called the meeting to order and asked Rob Jackson to lead the prayer.

II. Request to Speak – Renee Griffith, Archery Program

Renee runs an organization called S3DA, the North Carolina 3-d archery program. It is a North Carolina non-profit. They shoot three disciplines of archery: indoor, field archery (like they shoot in the Olympics) and 3-D (which is a course with simulated animals). They give away a lot of college scholarships. Their course is currently located behind the Department of Social Services. In the past two years, college scholarships have totaled \$3 million to NC archery students. Currently has \$4.4 million to give away in June – all to NC archers. Colleges offering scholarships: Emmanuel College, Bethel University, South Eastern Illinois College and more. Renee runs the shoots and it is very inexpensive. A child can have a membership for a year for \$25, which covers insurance. There isn't an archery program in Iredell County. Renee's organization leases 5 acres from the county which is where their archery course is located. Renee would like to explore forming a partnership with county where kids all over the county could compete. Children as young as third grade can start competing. Cleveland County has created a shooting sports complex. They ran a tournament last Saturday and had 80 youth competitors. The champion shoot will be June 8 in Mount Airy at Sage Creek Archery. There will be 300 or 400 competitors.

Per Michelle, there used to be an archery program within summer camps with simple target and a recurve bow. There was a lot of response from the parents. We had limited instructors at that time. Would be good to explore how to partner with this organization.

Renee – could be run like baseball teams. They train coaches and then the teams compete. Kids can earn individual awards and team awards. If a team wins a scholarship event, all the members on the team wins a scholarship. There are four types of bows:

Traditional (like an Indian would shoot)

Olympic Recurve (Olympics)

Two different compound bows

Elementary girls shoot against elementary girls on the same kinds of bow. Competition is a level playing field. As far as safety there are only two sports that are safer – badminton and bowling.

Rob – someone came to the schools years ago and wanted to pitch this as a sport in the schools. After meeting with the board, they declined because it is “a weapon”. Have you pitched this to the

schools to have them come to your place as a team competition? There are shooting sports but they do not take place on school property.

Renee – Hunter Safety teams are moving over to S3DA because of the scholarships. JOAD (Junior Olympic Archer Development Program) is another discipline that shoots archery and is very popular. NASP (National Archery in the Schools Program) is the largest archery program and is in the schools. They target sixth and seventh graders. Renee has not pitched it to the schools. Several charter schools have teams. This is a very controlled sport. Scholarships can be awarded to a child with a physical or learning disability because archery is not limited to academic or physical abilities. It has opened a lot of doors for children who have challenges. No colleges in North Carolina offer archery programs. There is a shoot on the school property (650 Glover Street) on May 18. It will be full. There will be 80 competitors and 200 spectators from all over the state. It will start at 9am. It will end at 12 noon. Awards are handed out at 12:30.

Marvin asked about the 4H camp and archery program. Renee said that Neal Loftin leads the 4H archery program. He is trained in S3DA is the lead on the 4H program and they have chosen to stay with the 4H program.

Been around for 6 years. Renee over it in NC for 3 years.

Division updates since March Meeting:

ONGOING OR CONTINUED AREAS OF FOCUS:

- *Michelle continues to serve as needed in an advisory role to the Town of Troutman for park planning. Their committee was formally dissolved, but Michelle has agreed at the request of Emily Watson, Parks & Recreation Coordinator for Troutman*
- *Continue to work with NC Department of Public Safety and Community Corrections; community service candidates to help with projects*
- *Michelle continues to serve on the Chamber of Commerce committee for Statesville's Leading Ladies*

NEW UPDATES FROM DIRECTOR:

- Lease agreement with Duke Energy is still in revisions; now with NCACC insurance representatives; goal is to present to Board of Commissioners, on May 21st for approval. This will be a 40 year lease.
- Coordinating move of all remaining parks and rec supplies from storage in the basement of the Government Center to the EMS base on the corner of Meeting and Sharpe Streets. Must have moved out by the end of May. EMS base is a temporary landing zone for our things. Later, building a storage building on site at the Rec Center. Also clean out documents based

on the retention policy approved by the Commissioners. EMS base is shared with the Iredell County Genealogy society.

- Continued efforts to finalize required changes and recommendations to be in compliance with Fire Marshal, and NCACC (risk management for insurance purposes) at both the Recreation Center and the Admin offices.
- Currently serving on committee for planning and coordinating the event “The Longest Table”
- Submitting MOA for Athletic Facility Usage with Iredell Statesville Schools to Board of Commissioners on May 7th. Rob, Daniel and Michelle have worked to get that to a place that it is ready to present. Will be presented to the Board of Education Monday night and presented to the Commissioners on Tuesday night. Michelle will send an electronic copy to board members. Once in place, will go into effect July 1.
- Finalized Inter-local agreement revisions with the Town of Troutman, submitting to Board of Commissioners on May 21st. (See attached). Under responsibilities #2, county agrees to provide a single point of contact for town to share programming and maintenance schedules. The town will be the central point of contact for reservations. County will provide annual inspections for play structures. County will inspect Troutman’s park once a year and they will come and inspect Stumpy Creek once a year. County will continue to mow ball fields during the 28 week mowing season. County will program the field. Daniel will monitor the field conditions during soccer. Town of Troutman will do it outside of our season. County will no longer clean the bathrooms in the pavilion. They have some part time staff to take care of that. County will extend Rec Center memberships to the town employees and families with an annual family membership rate of \$275 per year.

Motion was made to enter closed session. Barb made the motion. _____ seconded.

- Finalized Pool Management contract for FY19, submitting for FY20 to Board of Commissioners on May 7th. Pool manager has been hired. On site meeting with all contracted life guards, general manager, pool manager, accounting staff to finalize all pool detail. Open Memorial Day weekend. Individual pool passes are available for anyone not a member of the gym. Drop in rate \$5.00 per day or a pass for the season. We did an RFQ process for pool contract. This company has been so good we would like to lock them in for 2020. Typically these contracts go out in September. Pool management is generally year round. Upkeep in the off months and run the pool in the summer months. Pool contract for 2020 goes before the commissioners next week. They put a new pool pump in, shocked the pool three times at no cost to us, given us all kinds of feedback, insight and guidance. They are giving us used life guard stands and umbrellas. Swim Club Management Group out of Cornelius area. This company manages the Town of Mooresville pool and the Huntersville Aquatics and Fitness Center for the Town of Huntersville, Buncome County to name a few.
- Finalized supplemental insurance location agreements except Silver and Fit but is close.
- Working with Membership Support Specialist to coordinate and finalize all of the expense moves from regular recreation budget to recreation center budget in Munis.
- Hosting cookout for departments who were critical in helping with our transition and move to new location (Admin, Finance, HR, Facility Services and IT). Kim and Michelle are paying for this out of their pockets because they feel really strongly about the fact that everyone has done such a good job of helping us.
- Working to coordinate staff training day with all new employees
- Upcoming event – Special Olympics at South Iredell. Parking will be at SIHS.

- The Longest Table is a free meal served to 1,200 people. Collaborative program between multiple agencies. Need 125 table hosts – have 29 signed up. Need 65 food servers – have 30 signed up. If there are any civic groups, churches who would like to serve, please share with them. Location will be Signal Hill Mall this year on the back side kind of around Sears. Statesville High was not an option for this year due to stadium renovations and construction.

Program overview:

- **Outdoor Education Center Relocation:**
 - Construction of the Ropes Course is complete. Poles are in the ground. Cables are strung. A commissioning inspection was completed on Monday. There are three follow up items. Grind out three stumps, zip line corridor needs a more flat area for dismount, a face board on whale watch needed to be replaced. All corrections have begun or will begin soon. Staff training starts on Monday. First program is May 22.
 - Hiring of staff is underway and trainings will be held the week of 5/6
 - Minor trail system construction is underway.
 - Working in-house to add/construct additional low course elements. 2 elements were provided with the Challenge Towers construction.
 - Moved all picnic tables from the old OEC location. 3 moved to admin house, 5 are at Rec Center and the rest are going to Jennings to use for the ropes course. The picnic tables are in good shape since they had been under pavilions. We wanted to save money and reuse them at another location. However the tables will be out in the elements at their new locations.
- **Camps**
 - Spring Break Camp from had 12 in attendance. We received very positive feedback from those participants and parents.
 - Summer Camps will run Monday-Friday for 6 weeks, June 17-July 26 (no camp 7/4 & 7/5)
 - Camp Iredell (ages 5-11): Avg cost \$130/week. Will operate out of Mooresville, Statesville & Troutman locations
 - Camp Iredell Adventures (ages 11-13): Avg cost \$175/week. Will operate out of Mooresville & Statesville locations

- Job Postings for summer camp positions are posted online. Most staff returning from previous years. New hiring due to site expansion and capacity.

Program registration information (start dates, schedules, ages, etc.):

- OEC program requests are coming in weekly. 5 scheduled already earliest being end of May.
- Camp registration started. Great response so far.
 - Camp Iredell (ages 5-11)
 - Mooresville (55 spots): FULL all 6 weeks, with a waitlist each week (some have 20+ on waitlists)
 - Statesville (35 spots): Average 16 registered per week
 - Troutman (20 spots): Average 15 registered per week
 - Camp Iredell Adventures (ages 11-13): 5 of 6 weeks are full. 20 Spots per week, average 19 registered so far.

- We have 1 group lined up so far for service projects to assist in trail construction. On May 7, ARS 8th grade is coming out to do a service project with us. On May 18, another group is coming out.
- 2 volunteers working on the weekends with Seth at the new OEC site. We could not have gotten the work done without the volunteers.
- Partnering with Get Fit Iredell for the Family Frenzy Event on Sunday, May 5 at the Iredell County Recreation Center. Need participants and volunteers for this free event! Frenzy starts at 2pm. Setup will start around 11:30am, station volunteers @ 1pm. Finish by 4/4:30pm.

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V. Park Report

Bigleaf Slopes Park:

- NCICL bike race was canceled due to weather
- Did a special story with regular park user, David Bourgoins, who has walked over 1086 miles at Bigleaf since November 2016. He loves this facility. Michelle walked the trail with him and he’s glad to know how to call if he see something we need to know.

Proposed Carolina Thread Trail – Bigleaf to Greenbriar: No update

Jennings Park:

- Construction on Ropes Course project has been completed – ground breaking was in April; commissioning inspection was on Monday. Correcting 2 minor issues and staff training starts Monday, May 6th
- New scoreboard is being donated by Babe Ruth league – Facility Services is installing the electrical point for installation at Field 4
- Requesting funding for construction designs for phase I and phase II in the FY 20 budget (\$300,000)

Old Outdoor Education Center and Ropes Course Relocation Site:

- Work still needs to be done in order to remove debris from culvert going under the road, causing some backup and localized ponding of water
- Have removed all picnic tables, benches, and some other materials and are re-using them at the Rec Center and at the new Ropes Course location at Jennings.
- Moving forward with a voluntary annexation to Mooresville. Working with Matthew Todd on a survey.

Recreation Center and Administrative Offices

- Waiting on Facility Services to coordinate construction and install of sign, per Town of Troutman requirements.
- Working to get estimates for interior pool gate to address egress and pool access prevention from locker rooms during off season hours.
- HVAC unit in gymnasium had to be replaced. Transferred funds from savings in insurance and fees to help cover the unexpected costs. Athletic Director, Daniel, saved about \$10,000 in insurance fees because he applied for baseball and soccer insurance early and got the early bird rates. That savings allowed us to find the funds to replace AC unit.

Scotts Rosenwald Park: No update

Stumpy Creek Park:

- Moving forward with the overflow parking lot project – funds to be allocated July 1st. Bid process will open within next 2-3 weeks. We would love to have this project completed before the start of the fall soccer season.

East Iredell Lions Club Community Park

- Waiting on Facility Services to coordinate install of tile flooring and parking lot gravel
- Walking trail is complete – with the exception of the park bench installation; received final grant funding (\$3500 from Get Fit Iredell) to finish project.

Trees of Distinction Program: No update

Rob expressed his concerns about the fall golf tournament. It is tentatively set for the same weekend as the Megan Knox Tournament. It is a big tournament that would pull away from any golf outing we planned. The Megan Knox tournament usually has 30 teams. Rob will sent Kim an email tomorrow.

VI. OLD BUSINESS

a. Sponsorship Packet update

Kevin sent feedback to Michelle to do away with the bricks. Buy brick for \$100. Challenge would be to put it in a place that it is visible. Hard to find that “right” spot. Many people could not give thousands of dollars for a field but could give \$100 to buy a brick. Make a path. Put in a pavilion. The entrance to the library has bricks with names. Trees and benches may be a better option but do not take bricks out. Many other localities do not have specific dollar amount tied to naming rights. Verbiage goes along with “call us and we will discuss”. Michelle would like to wrap up and put on Commissioner’s May 21 agenda.

ADA compliant fields: A group is going around to sporting events and while they are there they are checking all the facilities to see if they are ADA compliant. Then they will write letters and complaints about. Michelle got a letter that the future design on Jennings Park does not include handicap accessibility. He also complained that the soccer complex (Michelle clarified that those fields belong to the City of Statesville and not Iredell County) accessing between fields is a big ditch. He can’t get from this field to that field. There is a code requirement. Some sports fields get to a certain point but you can’t make every point on the field handicap accessible point. When plans are submitted for final construction, Rebecca and Daniel will be looking at that and making sure that it meets appropriate

standards. The majority of the soccer complex is accessible, each field is accessible from one point or another from a wheelchair. Michelle pointed out to the gentleman that we specifically built an observation platform at Scotts Rosenwald that is designed for a wheelchair to pull up beside a bench. We need to be intentional about making sure our budget doesn't get cuts the point that we can't put in sidewalks for handicap accessibility.

b. Bylaws revision update

Chris has worked on gathering the information he received from people. Got five responses from people. He will email the information to Michelle. She would like to get it across the finish line for June.

c. Athletic facility usage update

Already included in staff reports. Present MOA to commissioners next week. ISS has met with all the recreation groups. Did not get a lot of complaints. Lots of questions but questions are good. The process hasn't changed. The flow chart (same as 5 years ago) and showed it to everyone. The reporting now goes to Rob instead of Iredell County. The variance was to explain between soccer and baseball and the rest of the sports. There may be some confusion to start. Not everyone was up to speed with all the paperwork we need to have in for background checks for every coach for the year. It will be an ongoing thing. Good turn out when me with the groups. Groups are working better amongst themselves. Michelle has had two phone calls from the same gentleman who is not 100% supportive of the direction we are going with this. He does believe that youth athletics needs to be in the parks and rec department. Michelle explained that there wasn't really anything changing from ICPRD process to ISS process. The only thing changing is who they turn the paperwork into. He said that was not his concern. His concern was the continuity of operations, the idea of having a single point of contact who is charge of a program who is running a program and provided accountability piece for these athletic associations. He asked several questions about the decision making process and how we go here. The current process is not efficient and didn't make a lot sense. There are people in the community that feel ICPRD should run all youth athletics. He's coming from a good place but don't know how to make what he wants to happen work. Per Marvin, Recreation did not run athletics in the past. They just funded the ball fields.

Summer meeting schedule and location. Trying to figure out how to do this by the pool and do a pool party. Need everyone to look at their calendars so we can pick a good time. Pool closes each day at 6pm. There will be swim lessons from 6:30 to 8pm. We should be able to coordinate around swim lessons if we need to. After some discussion, the date of June 19th was settle on. Stacy will send a meeting invitation out. Start at 6:30 since the pool is open til 6pm.
